Sec. Justin Brown served the state of Oklahoma as both the Director of the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (2019-2022) and as Cabinet Secretary of Human Services (2020-2023). While at Oklahoma Human Services, Brown oversaw the state's largest agency by workforce and introduced a grassroots strategic planning effort and human services operating system known as the 'True North.' Because of this transformational approach, OKDHS was able to remain focused on the agency's long-term strategies during the pandemic, instead of assuming a defensive posture during this time of dramatic disruption. As a strong relationship builder, Brown built a culture of true collaboration with state and federal agencies, local non-profits, philanthropic foundations, legislators, and the communities the agency serves, aligning stakeholders in a shared vision and with connected definitions of success.

Pyramid Model Peer Learning Communities Supporting Oklahoma's Workforce

Paula Brown

Director of Oklahoma Head Start Collaboration Office & Oklahoma Association of Community Action Agencies

Paula Brown has 38 years of experience in Head Start and the world of young children and families. She previously completed 23 years as the Disabilities Services Manager for United Community Action Head Start and has served Oklahoma as their Head Start Collaboration Director since 2021. She earned her BS in Psychology from Oklahoma State University in 1985 and her master's in special education from Ashford University in 2013 and is working on her Ph.D. in Human Development & Family

Sciences from Oklahoma State University. She has extensive experience as an Adjunct Instructor in Early Childhood Education and Child Development at Northern Oklahoma College and Oklahoma State University. She has been a Governor's appointee to Oklahoma's Coordinating Council on Early Childhood Intervention (ICC) since 1998, currently serves as the chair of the Infant Mental Health Committee for the ICC, she serves on Oklahoma's Stakeholder's Group for Preventing Obesity, is on Oklahoma's Pyramid Model State Leadership Team, Oklahoma Partnership for School Readiness's Board of Directors, Autism Foundation of Oklahoma's Early Childhood committee, and Oklahoma's Clearinghouse on Early Childhood Success.

The Pyramid Model is a comprehensive, multi-tiered framework of evidence-based practices that promote the social, emotional, and behavioral development of young children. The model promotes the skills necessary for young children, from birth to age 5, to understand and manage their emotions. In addition, it addresses disparities in discipline practices; promotes family engagement; and fosters inclusion of children with, and at risk for, developmental delays and disabilities.

Chie Novori-Corbett, PhD, MSSW

Associate Director of Research/Associate Professor, Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work, Dodge Family College of Arts and Sciences, University of Oklahoma

Dr. Noyori-Corbett is the founder of OU's Humanitarian Innovation Research Group (HIRG) (ou.edu/hirg) which is to bring awareness to refugee integration issues in the United States. Dr. Novori-Corbett received certificates from the Refugee Studies Center and Oxford Poverty and Human Development Initiative at the University of Oxford, England. She worked at Oxford with scholars and practitioners from all over the world to understand

the critical issues around displaced populations. The knowledge she gained has been fully utilized in the development of HIRG with its transdisciplinary faculty members at OU, as she realized the importance of a holistic approach in helping solve hardships forced upon immigrants. Dr. Noyori-Corbett worked with the US State Department both in 2017 and 2019 for the projects titled "Diplomacy Lab." She designed and initiated the first-time research-based class in which Master of Social Work (MSW) students could apply research skills they obtained as a pre-requisite for a largescale research project.

Her publications regarding survival migrations and feminized migration have been published in prestigious journals such as the Journal of International Social Work, Journal of International Social Welfare, Journal of Social Work Education, and so on. She has been awarded multiple OU internal grants and some external grants. With the members of the HIRG, Dr. Noyori-Corbett received a prestigious federal grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to investigate refugee services in public libraries. The refugee population she has been working with are mainly from Myanmar and Afghanistan who reside in Oklahoma and Texas. Her long-term community participatory research has been conducted specifically for the purpose of better understanding of challenges Myanmar women face.



Boo-Young Lim Doctoral Candidate, Research Assistant, Jeanine Rainbolt College of Education, University of Oklahoma

Boo-Young Lim is a doctoral candidate and a research assistant at the University of Oklahoma. Boo-Young had worked for a teacher preparation program in Myanmar. As a program coordinator, she developed and modified the teacher preparation program with the Myanmar Department of Social Welfare. She is interested in teacher education, technology integration, and culturally responsive teaching for dual language learners and children from refugees. She published articles in the areas of implementing strategies for the Official Development Assistant in early childhood education and cross-cultural, culturally responsive pedagogy.

Learn the Signs. Act Early. **Outcomes of CDC's Developmental Health Initiative on the Early** Identification of Developmental Delay in Young Children

Bonnie J. McBride, PhD Associate Professor of Pediatrics University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Director, Oklahoma Autism Center CDC's Act Early Ambassador to Oklahoma

Bonnie McBride, Ph.D., BCBA-D is an Associate Professor in the Department of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics at the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center. Her research interests include early identification and use of evidence-based interventions for autism and other neurodevelopmental disabilities. In addition to her faculty position, she provides professional development to educators and other professionals throughout the state on a variety of autismrelated topics. She has worked with several state agencies to improve early identification and intervention services for children with developmental disabilities including autism. In her role as Oklahoma's Ambassador for the CDC's Learn the Signs. Act Early. program, she promotes the importance of developmental monitoring, screening, and entrance into intervention as soon as a delay is identified. Most recently, she is partnering with Oklahoma Partnership for School Readiness (OPSR) to improve developmental outcomes for young children by enhancing early identification within early childhood systems using Learn the Signs. Act Early. as part of the recently awarded Preschool Development Grant to DHS and OPSR.

Learn the Signs. Act Early. Is a program that aims to improve the early identification of children with autism and other developmental disabilities so children and families can get the services and support they need.
